



NNSWCD DIRECTOR ELECTIONS

The election of Directors for the Northern Neck Soil & Water Conservation District will take place during the upcoming November 2023 general election. Candidates must reside within the District boundaries which encompasses Lancaster, Richmond, Northumberland, and Westmoreland Counties.

A Certificate of Candidate Qualification

An election of Directors for the Northern Neck Soil & Water Conservation District (NNSWCD) will be held in the general election on November 7, 2023. The District encompasses the Counties of Lancaster, Northumberland, Richmond, and Westmoreland, which includes any incorporated towns therein.

Candidates for elected directors must reside within the boundary of the county (includes incorporated town(s) within the county) which such candidates shall represent upon election. Two* directors shall be elected to represent all the citizens within each county, which includes incorporated towns within the county.

Persons who wish to file as candidates for the office of district director must fully complete and file the requisite nominating petition, statement of qualification, and declaration of candidacy with the general registrar of the county where the candidate resides by 7:00 p.m. on June 20, 2023.

NNSWCD PRODUCER CONFERENCE

On March 16th, the NNSWCD held a Producer Conference at the Westmoreland County Fire Department in Montross. A delicious, catered breakfast was provided by the Art of Coffee. The conference was advertised and open to all producers and/or growers in the Northern Neck. Presentations were given by Kathy Clarke (NNSWCD), Aaron Saunders (NNSWCD), Felicia Washington (FSA), Brody Ellis (NRCS), and guest speaker Zach Jacobs with Virginia Farm Bureau. Representatives from the Northern Neck Land Conservancy and Virginia State University (VSU) Small Farm Outreach Program were also introduced.

Kathy kicked the conference off by welcoming everyone and presenting over 80 years of history created by the Northern Neck SWCD. Aaron provided updates on the Virginia Agricultural Cost-Share Program as well as information regarding tax credits. USDA updates were given by Felicia and Brody regarding FSA and NRCS upcoming deadlines and programs.

Guest speaker Zach Jacobs is the Legislative Specialist of Governmental Relations with Virginia Farm Bureau. He covered the topic "Ag Road Law" which included updates on the use of Farm Use Tags and Permanent Farm Plates. All producers, partners and staff that attended this event found his presentation very informative and helpful as many questions regarding this topic were answered.

For everyone who has an unfunded FY20-FY22 Conservation Stewardship Program application (this is the 5-year program that we commonly just refer to as CSP), <u>ALL</u> non-funded CSP applications from last year were referred to this year. And we are now planning the FY23 applications, so if yours has not yet been funded the past couple years, expect a call from us to determine what we can add to your application to make it more competitive for this year's funding cycle.

We will be conducting our LWG (local working group) meeting soon. This is the meeting where we take feedback and responses from our customers and partners and try our best to integrate changes into future programs (within reason, some policy is dictated by the farm bill). If you would like to be included in the invitation to the LWG meeting, please call or email me and I'll make sure you are on the list!

We have a new face in the office! Dylan Lockwood has joined our team at Warsaw NRCS to help serve NNK farmers and landowners. I'll be sure to include a picture and short bio of Dylan in the next newsletter, but if you're in the office, please stop by and introduce yourself.

2023 NNSWCD ACADEMIC SCHOLARSHIP RECIPENTS

Each year the NNSWCD awards two \$1,000 scholarships to students in the Northern Neck:

The <u>J.C. Berger Conservation Advancement Scholarship</u> is open to students with permanent residency within Lancaster, Northumberland, Richmond, or Westmoreland Counties, who will begin a full-time, first-year college curriculum in natural resource conservation and/or environmental studies.

The <u>James Edward Minor Ag Stewardship Award</u> is open to full-time undergraduate college students with permanent residency within Lancaster, Northumberland, Richmond, or Westmoreland Counties. Applicants must be enrolled in a college-level curriculum in natural resource conservation and/or environmental studies.



Anne Kathryn Martz, the recipient of the **NNSWCD** J.C. Berger Conservation Advancement Scholarship in the amount of \$1,000, attends Rappahannock High School and the Chesapeake Bay Governor's School. Anne Kathryn will be studying Agricultural Education at Virginia Tech. Anne Kathryn is very involved with the FFA and currently serves as the President. She also volunteers in community through FFA, the Haven, Healthy Kids Run and other groups. Her love for agriculture, education and conservation made her the standout recipient of this scholarship.

Emma Packett, the recipient of the NNSWCD James Edward Minor Ag Stewardship Award in the amount of \$1,000, attended Rappahannock High School and the Chesapeake Bay Governor's School. Emma is studying Crop Soil and Environmental Science with a minor in Agribusiness at Virginia Tech. Emma had an active role in FFA, serving in many roles including President, and 4-H. Emma is now active in Agronomy Club, Eventing Club and Block and Bridle at VT. Her continued pursuit of conservation in agriculture meets the District's vision.

Virginia Agricultural Cost-Share Program (VACS)

Our technical team has been hard at work in preparation for the busy season coming up. Check out these upcoming dates and reminders that producers need to keep in mind:

- Cover Crop Burn Down: Started March 15th
- Cover Crop Burn Down: Ends No Later Than June 1st
- <u>Report Planned Corn Plantings to NNSWCD ASAP</u> for 2023 Sidedress Payments
- Next Cost-Share Sign Up Period: July 3rd August 11th

Virginia Conservation Assistance Program (VCAP)

The NNSWCD currently has six living shoreline projects under construction and two additional projects pending approval. Over 650 linear feet of shoreline will be protected with a natural wetland.

What is a living shoreline? A living shoreline is a shoreline management practice that provides erosion control and water quality benefits. These benefits include:

- protection and restoration of natural shoreline habitat
- maintaining of coastal processes
